Webinars: Upskilling, Sharing Experiences, Connecting Campuses, Saving Time

NTNU is Norway's largest university with over 40,000 students. The university's headquarters are in Trondheim, with two further main campuses in Gjøvik and Ålesund plus smaller decentralised campuses. NTNU's Teaching and Learning Centre uses webinars to help lecturers learn how to effectively use Blackboard, these webinars are run by our learning assistants regularly. The medical faculty has started to use webinars as part of its further education courses for healthcare professionals in outlying districts. NTNU runs Webinarfestival, a web-based conference, that connects higher education educators from all over Norway to share their experiences with student active learning and digital technology. We run webinars for departments that have staff on different campuses who appreciate that all participants can participate on an equal footing regardless of which campus they work at.

In our session we will discuss the ways that NTNU is using webinars to upskill lecturers and administrative staff as well as how academic departments use webinars in their courses. Practically we will talk about how we have tried to foster a culture of good webinar-manners. We will talk about the programmes available to run webinars and especially our use of Blackboard's Collaborate and how we fully utilise its functions. We will discuss the benefits and disadvantages of using webinars and discuss how best to make webinars successful. We hope to create debate around how webinars are used today and how the higher education sector can reap the benefits offered by them.

From Dandelion to Lion King – A Transformational Journey

This talk will cover some of the many pedagogical and technical projects which the University engaged in and report on the ongoing journey to meet strategic objectives and improve student experience.

This academic year has been one of trials (of the testing variety and at times of the 'by fire' variety), demos (many, many demos) and an exploration of the new toys sorry features provided by the new 'Training and Development Manager'. This session will take you through our process of designing a new



online course while carrying out a pilot of TDM and how we as a team have found this experience, how our students are finding it and our plans for phase two.

We will share our learning design processes and how they have complimented the TDM features we have been piloting and participants will have the opportunity to explore some of our ideas first-hand and contribute to the session.

I will introduce our 'AA Avatars' and share how they were developed and why, and each team of participants will be invited to design their own Avatars. I will then use the 'AA Avatars' to demo areas of TDM and share tools with the audience that we have embedded within the system.

Finally, at the end I will present our current thinking on how the capabilities of TDM will allow us to provide solutions to many long standing training and development needs across the College

If time permits, we will open the discussion to the audience, to explore the TDM features and how they might be used in other institutions' contexts.
